

HOW TO MAKE INCENSE

Materials you will need:

- Unscented incense
- Oil fragrances
- DPG (Di Propylene Glycol)
- A tray to hold incense
- A second tray, rack, or screen
- Bags to store the finished sticks



Unscented Incense Get 88 sticks for \$1.49 Get 880 sticks for \$7.95 Get 8,800 sticks for \$69.95

Step #1

Mix ½ of your favorite fragrance oils with ¾ DPG; but experiment a little first. If you get black smoke when you burn the incense, your solution has too much DPG.

Step #2

Soak incense sticks in the fragrance oil blend you have prepared. Soak for at least 24 hours. You can use the least oil by soaking your incense horizontally in a flat pan instead of vertically in a bottle. When making large quantities of incense for re-sale, soak the sticks upright in 5 gallon buckets.

Step #3

After soaking the incense, remove incense sticks and let them dry for 24 hours. Baking racks work best for drying the incense, but you can also use a plastic or metal sheet. You can recycle the oil that runs off the sticks for future incense. Do not dry incense on paper, because the sticks will stick to the paper.
