## **Celebrate Black History Month**

#### February is dedicated to Black History Month


Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month, which is a time dedicated to acknowledging and celebrating the achievements of not only African Americans, but also the progress made towards racial equality in America. This month-long observance is credited to historian Carter G. Woodson, who in 1926 established it as 'Negro History Week' (a week that included both his birthday and President Lincoln's), with a goal to educate both black and white Americans about contributions made by African-Americans throughout history.

Carter G. Woodson is now recognized as the "Father of Black History".

#### This year's theme

In honor of Black History Month, 2022's national theme is "Black Health and Wellness."

The 2022 theme considers activities, rituals and initiatives that Black communities have practiced in an effort to maintain health and wellbeing. The theme each year is chosen by ASALH (Association for the Study of African American Life and History).

William Tucker was the first Black child known to be born in America in 1621.




Fourteenth Amendment passed; Blacks become citizens in 1868.

## The Dashiki: A symbol of Black History Month


Traditional dashikis are a big part of African culture and history. They have been worn for centuries as a symbol of pride, identity, or heritage in Africa itself - not just Black History Month!

The reason why so many people love wearing dashiki dresses is because they're comfortable enough to be lived with every day and they are eye-catching too.

#### The Dashikis role in Black History

In the 1960's, a dashiki was worn as an act of resistance. It symbolized black pride and acceptance into society despite Apartheid laws that prohibited them from wearing clothing such as suits or ties outside their workplace. This fashion statement became popular during this time period because Black Americans felt empowered by fighting against racial segregation.

The dashiki is a symbol of African culture that can be carried through American history by those who continue to wear it. It can serve as an important reminder during Kwanzaa and Black History Month, but many people just enjoy wearing one every day because they are comfortable and stylish!







## Do you know the Ruby Bridges story?

It was 1961, and the Federal government had just made a law that all white schools needed to allow black children. Ruby Bridges was one of the first black children to go to school this way, and was taken to school by US federal Marshals. This was because the state and local police did not want to help her into the school. She spent the day as the only child in her class, because parents didn't want their children to be in the same class with her.

A sort of famous child psychologist from Harvard went to interview her for a study he was doing on trauma in children. She was yelled at and cursed by mobs of angry people when she went to school. When he asked her how this made her feel, she talked about praying a lot. He asked her what she was praying, she said that she was praying for the angry people. She was praying for God to forgive them. He then asked why she was praying this when these people were so scary and yelling at her. She said it was because this is what Jesus did when he was on the cross. She prayed that God would forgive them because they do not know what they are doing. The highly respected Harvard psychologist talks about how he was deeply changed by talking with this 6 year old poor black girl from Louisiana.

The photo below shows 6 year old Ruby Bridges going to school in 1961 with a mob of angry people protesting and yelling at her.




# Three ways to show your pride for Black History Month




